To all members of the AAUP-UD Bargaining Unit,

On Friday, the <u>AAUP-UD wrote to the University's Office of General Counsel</u> requesting that the University publicly affirm its commitment to a series of protections for students and employees, particularly in relation to federal investigations and immigration enforcement. We seek clear policies ensuring non-disclosure of personal information, assurance that UD Police will not voluntarily share information with federal agencies, and non-compliance with the expanded Executive Order 13899. We have requested a response by April 30, 2025 and are requesting a consultation with OGC and the University's chosen immigration attorneys for further information.

The Executive Council supports UD graduate student calls for similar clarification and support, and national AAUP's lawsuits to protect <u>academic freedom</u>, stop <u>punitive cuts</u> <u>to research funding</u>, and preserve <u>the DOE</u>. Below we're attaching information received today from the American Federation of Teachers, with which AAUP is <u>affiliated</u>, and information about a Teach-in on Democracy for UD students and faculty.

We call upon President Assanis to sign on to the Presidents' Alliance on Higher Education and Immigration's <u>amicus brief</u> to <u>AAUP v Rubio</u> opposing the targeting of non-citizen students and faculty based on their scholarship, identity, or political views. Signatories include <u>Delaware State University</u> and many of our peer institutions.



## AFT Resources for members facing urgent immigration issues

Due to the Trump administration's policies, many of our members and their students are facing concerns regarding visa revocations, potential detainment and fear of deportation. AFT is launching a new Immigration Assistance Resource available to our higher education affiliate members. This resource is designed to provide assistance for immigration emergencies—visa

revocations, potential deportation, and any "unexpected changes in status," and is available to dues paying members only. We encourage you to share this information with members who may benefit from this service. To utilize the service, a short intake form is required (<u>Immigration Resource Intake Form</u>). A member of the higher education team will follow up with additional information regarding the resource within 24 hours of submission.
